Virtual Club Games Changes Monday, July 13th to Friday, 17th

During the week of **Monday, July 13th through Friday, July 17th** we will be running a trial changing 2 different aspects of our **Virtual Club** games:

1. Earlier start times for morning games

Morning games will start at 9:15 a.m. with registration beginning at 7:15.

Monday evening will maintain the start time of 6:45 p.m.

2. More boards

We will play either 20 or 21 boards. Normally we will play 2 board rounds, but 3 board rounds may be required depending on the number of registered pairs.

The Longest Day

The **London Bridge Centre** held their Day of Bridge Fundraiser for the [Alzheimer Society London and Middlesex](#) over the weekend of June 20th and 21st. The net proceeds of \$419.46, earned by the LBC from the 28 pairs who participated in each of the Saturday and Sunday games, will be donated to the Alzheimer Society of London Middlesex. As well, \$3,011 was donated to the ASLM via the LBC Day of Bridge website. A further amount of \$222.53 will be donated to the Alzheimer Society of Canada by the ACBL and Bridge Base Online as these two organization have waived their table fees and a portion of their user fees to support the Day of Bridge Fundraiser.

The Alzheimer Society of London Middlesex is extremely grateful to receive a total of \$3,429.46 from those who supported our Day of Bridge Fundraiser.

Last year, ASLM served a record high of 3,000 active clients. To meet the growing need, the ASLM continue to rely on community support. With only 38% of their annual budget funded by the Ministry of Health, they must fundraise over \$1 million to deliver these vital support programs.

Many of us are much too familiar with the devastating impact of Alzheimer's disease on those who contract this illness and on their immediate caregivers. As a beneficiary of the services provided by the ASLM, I can attest that the assistance and guidance offered by the ASLM to me and my wife Paulette was extremely helpful in our efforts to cope and adjust to the early stages of this disease. Sadly, this kind of assistance continues to challenge the resources available from the ASLM.

I sincerely thank the LBC and all the individuals who donated to the ASLM.

**Hello to the Tuesday afternoon bunch!
I miss you.
Here is a lesson for you.**

Hand Evaluation throughout the Bidding Sequence

Count your points when you pick up your cards and don't count them again. BUT, re-evaluate as the bidding progresses.

Your partner opens the bidding. You are the responder. Does the value of your hand improve, worsen or stay the same?

Your partner opens 1 club.

You have no clear fit, but you still have enough value to bid 1 diamond. The value of your hand does not change.

Your partner opens 1 diamond.

Now we have a clear fit. The singleton heart along with the diamond fit improves the quality of your hand enough to bid 3 diamonds.

Your partner opens 1 heart.

The value of your hand decreases. Your best response would be 1 no trump.

Your partner opens 1 spade.

The singleton heart and 3 card support add value. You could bid 2 diamonds to show 10+ points. Then later bid 3 spades.
