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Response

Hi Like Toknow,

When the opponents interfere with any suit at the 2 level other than clubs all systems are generally off. If RHO makes a 2 - club o/c then systems can still be on with **double** being Stayman and other bids as you would always make including all transfers.

When the o/c is any of 2D, 2H, or 2S all bids at the 2 level should be natural and to play. Any bid made at the 3 level should be forcing and natural whether it is a jump or not. **Also, a cue bid of the overcalled suit should be Stayman and is forcing to game.**

An extension of those general guidelines is to add a little further twist, namely that 2 NT by responder is a transfer to 3C and responder can pass if they want to play a club partial or bid a suit below the overcalled suit which is then to play. The name for this system is **Lebensohl** and can be found in any bridge conventions book. As always there are a few more twists but the version I have explained above is almost always adequate.

Just to explain why transfers are no longer on:

If RHO makes a 2H overcall and you have a good hand with 4 or more hearts, you would prefer to make a penalty double rather than transfer to Spades. Other situations can easily arise when you as responder want to **double** the overcall. Hence it is generally more profitable to bid as I have suggested above. It covers virtually possible situations. As previously written, the only non-penalty double is a double of 2 clubs, which should be treated as Stayman.
