They also learn about how to use bidding boxes, scoring, and bridge etiquette. They meet other keen players and partners with whom they can continue their bridge journey.

One of the most popular bidding systems is the 2-over-1 Forcing-to-Game system. It's an adaptation of Standard American with 5-card majors. The main difference is in the meanings of 2-level responses to an opening bid.

The advantage of the 2-over-1 system is that it saves bidding space. After making the initial 2-level response, responder doesn't have to jump to show forcing-to-game values. Because the auction can stay low, opener and responder have more room to exchange information below game level and more ways to investigate slam possibilities.

VOLUNTEER PROFILE – AL EDWARDS - TREASURER

Where were you born? Strathroy General Hospital

Where did you go to school? S.S.#6, Bosanquet – a one-room schoolhouse; then North Lambton Secondary in Forest, Ontario; followed by the University of Waterloo for my B. Maths (Hons Co-op). After graduation, I earned Fellowships in the Canadian Institute of Actuaries and Society of Actuaries through their joint education and examination program of qualification.



What was your first job? On our family farm, helping with farm chores of all kinds. The herd of pigs, with six to ten sows, was my special responsibility and helped finance my education.

What job did you hold the longest in your working career? My career at London Life (including Great-West Life and Canada Life in the later years) was officially 33 years, plus two years of co-op terms in my student days and several years of part-time after my formal retirement. I was Chief Actuary for 12 of those years.

In How Many Cities Have You Lived? Two cities (London and Waterloo), and one farm near Arkona, Ontario.

What was your best vacation? A family vacation to Tanque Verde Ranch near Tucson, Arizona when our two daughters were 13 and 10 years old.

How old were you when you first started playing bridge? 20, in university.

How did you find LBC? My wife, Sue, and I were part of the group that founded LBC in 2015.

What motivated you to become a board member? I was on the first LBC board for six years, including two years as President. I returned to the board to help with the challenge of regaining financial sustainability for LBC after the pandemic setbacks.

What has surprised you most about becoming a game director? Until I qualified as a game director in 2008, I only had a general familiarity with the Laws of Duplicate Bridge. It's amazing how intricate they can be as they try to cover the various possible scenarios that might arise at the table! And the Masterpoint system gets complicated as it tries to recognize vastly different playing situations fairly.

What is your favourite part of being a board member? Getting to know and work with the other board members as they contribute their perspectives and expertise for the betterment of the club.

What do you like best about LBC? The amazing amount of volunteer effort that our members willingly contribute to sustain the club.

Tell us about your hobbies. I am an avid golfer – which is why I am rarely seen at LBC in the summer months, an avid reader, and grandpa to two grandchildren.

What would people be surprised to know about you? My baking specialty is banana cream pie, following my mother's recipe.

Partner opened with one club.

Holding this hand responder wanted to pass. "No!! I'm not bidding one heart with 6 points."

Helper explained, "Yes, we respond with 6 points."

"O.K. I will but if I go down it's your fault!!!!" Then laughter.

Yes. Respond with 6 points at the one level.

Here are some hands to think about.



5 points and flat Yes, you can pass this hand.



Although it is only 5 points, the length in the spade makes it worth a bid of one spade.
