

Negative Doubles – Part 1

Over the next three newsletters we will introduce Negative Doubles. Larry Cohen uses a better term: “Takeout Doubles by Responder” since the double is for takeout when partner has opened the bidding. It generally shows the unbid suits, and it ALWAYS shows the other major.



How and when is the negative double used?

Partner opens the bidding in one of a minor suit, right hand opponent overcalls, and you have a hand that is good enough to make a bid, but you have no suitable bid to make.

e.g., partner opens 1♣ and right-hand opponent bids 1♠. A negative double from you guarantees at least four hearts and some diamonds, or clubs.

How many points are needed to make a negative double?

- If the opponent's overcall is at the one-level: 6, 7 or more HCPs.
- If the opponent's overcall is at the two level: 8, 9 or more HCPs.
- If the opponent's overcall is at the three level: close to an opening bid.

There is no upper point limit for a negative double. It can be made with 15, 20 or even more HCPs.

In this issue we will examine what to do after partner opens one of a minor and right-hand opponent overcalls in spades.

Practice your bidding with these sample hands:

Partner opens 1♣ and right-hand opponent bids 1♠. What would you bid with each of these hands? Record your responses prior to reading the answers on the next page.

Partner opens 1♦ and right-hand opponent pre-empt 2♠. What would you bid with each of these hands?

Answers: Bridge players don't always agree on bidding sequences. If you do not agree with our answers, ask yourself why, then ask a person whose opinion you respect how they would bid and why they would bid that way. Bridge discussion is good!

A) Pass. Not enough strength to bid.



B) Double. You have both unbid suits, but not enough HCPs or length to bid a suit at the two-level.

Bidding 2♥ in this auction would show a five card (or more) heart suit, while a negative double shows four hearts.

C) Double. On the borderline, but you do not want the auction to go 1♣, 1♠, P, P, P. If partner bids 2♦ after your negative double, then you will have to bid 3♣. It might be too high, but your partnership has a good club fit.

D) Double. You cannot bid hearts at the two-level without five or more hearts. There is no upper limit for a negative double, but it does guarantee four hearts. You want to try for a 4-4 heart fit before playing the hand in a minor suit or No Trump. Also, should you be in game or a slam? Your next bid will probably be a cue bid in spades to show a hand that has extra values and an interest in slam.

E) 3H. With five or more hearts and a good hand bid 3♥. This is a forcing bid that partner cannot pass. At this level you show almost an opening bid or more.



F) Pass. When you are playing negative doubles, you cannot make a penalty double with this hand. If you double, partner will assume that you are showing four hearts and some clubs, so you must pass. But what will happen if you pass 2♠? You hope partner will re-open with a 'Balancing' double and you will pass.

G) Double. You want to be in game, but don't know which game. Partner will bid hearts with a four-card heart suit. If not, then No Trump, clubs or diamonds will be partner's next bid and you should consider cue bidding spades to show a hand that has extra values, an interest in slam and shortness in spades.

H) 3NT. You have opening points, two spade stoppers and enough to be in game. 3NT is not guaranteed but probably is the best chance for game rather than five of a minor.

In the next issue we will look at what to respond when partner opens a minor, and right-hand opponent overcalls in hearts.

ASK DWIGHT

Friday Afternoon January 5, Board 9

With the strong two-suited (literally!) North hand, do you open 1S and risk hearing 3 passes; or 2C and hope to tell partner about both suits somehow? How should the auction go after the opening bid? At our table the auction started with 1S by North followed by East bidding 2NT showing both minors. What auction(s) do you recommend?

Amazing hand! First of all, I would open 2C since I have game in my own hand. Assuming the opponents pass throughout a reasonable auction would be:

2C – 2D (waiting)
2S – 3D (natural)
3H – 4H
5C – 5D
6H – P

Opener North should be showing at least 5/5 in the majors when they rebid 3H. Hence responder South can raise to 4H with 3 card support in hearts. North should continue with a 5C control cuebid as does South with 5D. Since South has denied 3 card spade support by bidding 3D North jumping to slam in hearts seems a strong favourite.

In the second scenario when East bids 2NT showing both minors after a 1S opening, South should make a card-showing double while denying 3 card spade support. The likely auction will be:

1S - 2NT - X - 3/4/5C

6H - P - P - P

The interference bid of 2NT in fact should help the opponents get to the slam in this case. Because of the double by South, North knows that partner is highly unlikely to have 3 card spade support, otherwise they would raise spades. They also know that South has values and bidding 6H asks partner to either pass or correct to 6S with equal preference to both majors.
