## **SUNDAY, MARCH 3 - SWISS TEAM GAME @ 1 P.M.**

Put this date in your calendar and join us for some Swiss cheese and wine! (Bring your own wine, glasses supplied).

For those not familiar with Swiss teams here is a quick description and a <u>link</u> to learn more. The game is played with four-member teams (two pairs of players to a team). You pay your entry fee and fill out a four-person entry form, naming one as captain of the team. Your team will be ranked by your team's total masterpoints.

You play in a head-to-head competition just like duplicate bridge. The difference in Swiss Team is that your N-S pair plays the E-W pair from another team and their N-S pair plays your E-W pair.

Sign up at the club. Full team sign-ups are encouraged. Those who sign up as a pair will be matched with other pairs if possible. The **deadline to sign up a team is Friday, March 1** at midnight.

There is no point-level qualification, just make up a team!

The cost is \$8, for four rounds of six boards.

The game will award points as 50% red and 50% black.

# **Negative Doubles - Part 2**

In this issue we look at responses you can make when partner opens one of a minor and your right-hand opponent makes an overcall in hearts. Surprisingly, your opponent has helped, rather than hindered, your bidding.



#### How does the opponent's heart overcall help your bidding?

You can now differentiate between holding a four-card or a longer spade suit. Make a negative double with four spades but bid one spade if you have 5 or more spades.

e.g. 1♠ - 1♥ - Double (I have 4 spades partner, and some diamonds or clubs.)
1♦ - 1♥ - 1♠ (I have 5 or more spades partner.)

When you make a negative double over the opponent's heart bid you *guarantee* four spades. Generally you should have 4+ cards in the other minor, or in partner's minor. The negative double showing a four-card spade suit can also be used when your right-hand opponent pre-empts two or three hearts.

#### How many points are needed to make a negative double?

- If the opponent's overcall is at the one-level: 6, 7 or more HCPs.
- If the opponent's overcall is at the two level: 8, 9 or more HCPs.
- If the opponent's overcall is at the three level: close to an opening bid.

There is no upper point limit for a negative double. It can be made with 15, 20 or even more HCPs.

#### **Answers to the Quiz:**

You will not always agree with our answers. The important question to ask yourself is, "Why don't I agree?". Then ask a person, whose opinion you respect, what they would bid and why.

• 14. Close. Yes, you only have 5 points (4 HCPs plus one length point) but it might be your last chance to tell partner that you have five spades. Also, you want partner to lead spades on defence. Bidding aggressively generally pays off.



- B) **Double**. You have both unbid suits. However, freely bidding 1 would show 5+ spades, and you do not have enough HCPs or length to bid diamonds at the two-level.
- C) **Double**. You have four spades and enough HCPs to make a negative double at the one level. If partner bids 2♦ then you will have to bid 3♣. It might be too high, but you will have a fit.
- D) **Double**. There is no upper limit for a negative double. However, you cannot bid spades at the one-level holding fewer than five spades. Your first goal is to try for a 4-4 spade fit before playing the hand in a minor suit or No Trump. Your next bid should be hearts, showing shortness, strength and trying for slam.
- E) 2♠. This bid shows 5+ spades and 10+ HCPs. Your next bid could be difficult. Depending on what partner bids, do you have enough for game, and where?



- F) **Pass.** A double here is negative, showing 4 spades. If you double, partner will take it out, probably to spades (maybe 4♠ if she holds four of them). What happens when you pass? You hope partner will 'Balance' with a double and you will happily pass. You might be tempted to bid NT with hearts stopped. However, 3NT is not a certainty, and a juicy penalty will probably be a top board. Understanding the concept of 'Balancing' is important as you progress in your bridge skills.
- G) **Double**. You want to be in at least game, but which game? If possible, you want to play in a 4-4 spade fit whenever partner has four spades. If not, then you want to play in No Trump if partner has hearts stopped. After partner's response to your negative double, be sure to bid game.
- H) **3NT**. You have opening points, two heart stoppers and enough to be in game. 3NT is not guaranteed but probably is the best chance for game rather than five of a minor. Remember: Diamonds are for your finger!
